Upper-division course covering the political, social, economic, and cultural impact of democratic regimes, including the United States, France, Germany, Spain, Japan, and India. Sample readings: Robert Dahl, *On Democracy;* Alexis de Tocqueville, *Democracy in America;* Detlev Peukert, *The Weimar Republic;* John Hooper, *The New Spaniards.*

Hist 241 Special Topics: Religion and Society in Europe since 1715

Upper-division course covering the social impact of religion in Europe since the

Enlightenment. Major themes included the influence on rationalism on religion, religious responses to secular government, the rise of mass religious movements, and the impact of

changing religious ideals on social categories (such as gender).

Hist 325 History of Spain

Upper-division course covering Spanish History since the Roman period, with special focus on the period since 1808. Topics included the Spanish reconquest and discovery of America, the Second Republic and Civil War, and the Franco dictatorship and subsequent democratic transition.

Hist 307 Europe since 1914

Upper-division course on twentieth-century European history, beginning with World War I. Major topics discussed were the world wars, Russian Revolution, Dictatorship and Democracy in the interwar period, the Cold War, and the collapse of the European empires. Sample readings: Timothy Garton Ash. The Magic Lantern: The Revolution of '89 Witnessed in Warsaw, Budapest, Berlin and Prague; Christopher Browning. Ordinary Men: Reserve Police Battalion 101 and the Final Solution in Poland; Sheila Fitzpatrick. The Russian Revolution.

Hist 202 World Civilization from 1500

Large survey course with teaching assistants.

Hist 201 World Civilization to 1500

Large survey course with teaching assistants.

EUH 4930 From Mussolini to Milosevic: Nationalism and Violence in Twentieth-century Europe

Special topics course cross-listed with the Center for European Studies. Studied the relationship between extreme nationalism and violence, paying special attention to the rise
